CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

University has the authority to revise or upgrade the curriculum after consulting with the college teachers. Many of our teachers contribute in syllabi formulation as member of the board of studies in different subjects. Academic calendar is prepared for every semester to deliver the curriculum effectively. Our college provides Honours & Program courses of 27 subjects at Under Graduate level and 1 subject at Post Graduate level. College prepares academic calendar considering the University calendar. All the classes, home assignments and presentations follow the curriculum plan. Master routine is prepared for Arts, Commerce and Science subjects at the beginning of semester. College provides projectors, laptops, smart board and virtual class room to carry out ICT based teaching. The partially digitalized college central library stocks of large number of updated books, journal, newspapers, e-resources and references according to curriculum for the students and teachers. These assets are updated on regular basis. Apart from central library, departmental library i.e. seminar library provides an array of curriculum based updated books that can be issued by students and teachers. Group discussion, case studies, MCQs, quiz and other class room activities are among the innovative teaching methods implemented by the teachers to enhance student understanding. Departments organize students' seminars beyond curriculum to enrich courses that aid in holistic development of students and better understanding of the subject. Moreover, departments organize seminars, special lectures and workshops to enable the students to interact with eminent personalities. Departments like Botany, Geography, History, Bengali, Urdu, Philosophy, Political Science, Microbiology and Zoology organize educational field visits according to curriculum and outside the curriculum to supplement the theory. Industrial trips are organized by departments of Chemistry, Physics, Microbiology and Commerce. Apart from educational tours departments organizes local field excursions on regular basis. Botany department conducts visits to hills to collect rare plant specimens like bryophytes, pteridophytes, lichens, gymnosperms, algae, and fungi etc. Zoology department also visits forest and sea shores and collects different kinds of specimen especially salt-water fishes. On regular basis internal assessments are conducted for each semester and an assessment also made for practical based subjects. Periodic monitoring

of academic performances such as class room discipline and timely course completion is done in the departmental meetings. Records of admission, studentteacher ratio, examinations etc. are maintained centrally by the institution.

Programme and Generic) are divided into several groups, each group comprising of 25-30 students. The teachers are then randomly selected as mentors of these groups. In a formal meeting of the college each group is introduced to its mentor. The mentor fixes meetings with his/her mentees and listens to whatever the mentees have to say, be it academic, familial or personal. The mentor tries his/her best to motivate them and sort out their problems. If things need to be reported to the Principal of the college, it is done without any hesitation or delay. All these are recorded in a register exclusively meant for this purpose. Since the mentees are selected rather randomly, they are generally found belonging to departments different from that of the mentor. This helps them to speak their hearts out. They can easily share their experiences and feelings with the mentor. If the mentor finds some problem most unlikely to be solved by him/her, he/she has it brought to the notice of the proper authority, of course with the intervention of the Principal, so that it can be redressed as soon as possible. Apart from these formal mentor-mentee meetings, students constantly keep in touch with the teachers of their own department in person or over telephone. The students calls and messages are gladly responded to by the teachers most of the time. Students who have already passed out of this college or are in the final semester often meet the teachers of the department concerned so as to decide their future course of action. Teachers always come up with the best suggestions and advices keeping several things in mind such as the strength and inclination of the students and their financial condition. The Principal of this college, too, takes special care of those students who are in need of help. She always tries to find some time out of her extremely busy schedule to talk to the students and know about their problems. There are numerous instances of the Principal meeting the guardians of the students and convincing them of the dangers of a hastily fixed marriage as well as the benefits of higher studies. No wonder, all these efforts made for overall development of the students pay off in the long run.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

To ensure academic excellence on the part of the students continuous internal evaluation (CIE) are held in the college. The evaluations are made well in advance of the end-semester exams so as to give the students opportunities to identify their problems and find means to sort them out, of course with the help of teachers. What is noteworthy here about the internal assessments is that these are held centrally with the schedule of tests and duty charts of invigilators prepared by examination committees of internal and end-semester exams for different semesters. This makes the entire process of continuous internal evaluations (CIE) fair and transparent. Moreover, different question patterns are used to engage the attention of the students in a better way, some of them being the MCQ, very short answer type, short answer type and sometimes descriptive. In one semester the students have to take the internal evaluation in open book mode. One unique feature of the continuous internal evaluation of this college is that for particular semesters the students have to sit for internal assessment online. This not only introduces them to the digital world around us, but also prepares them for different online competitive exams. Again, for ENVS projects students are encouraged to use materials that can be

easily recycled. Once the tests are over, the teachers sit personally with the non-teaching staff of the college to upload the marks obtained by students at the University marks capturing portal to minimize any possibility of error.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

In the very beginning of every academic year Kazi Nazrul University sends an academic calendar to its affiliated colleges. In strict adherence to that calendar this institution prepares an even more exhaustive academic calendar. The academic calendar in the form of booklets is distributed to each and every student. Thus they come to know about different academic programmes well in advance. This helps them prepare for continuous internal evaluation (CIE) and the end-semester exams in a more systematic way. The teachers teaching a particular course can also plan their teaching more effectively with the help of this. The academic calendar also proves helpful to the families of the students so far as their planning and arrangements for any family celebration or treatment of patients is concerned. Thus, the academic calendar of the college is instrumental in ensuring completion of the course in time, mentally preparing the students for internal evaluation and end-semester exams much before these are finally scheduled, thereby making the entire academic process smooth and effective.

Maintenance of the existing infrastructure is the primary need for effective teaching and learning process of any institution. In this regard, the institution frames out its infrastructural development policy considering the strength of student, changes in the curriculum and the new courses to be introduced. Any major infrastructural change is discussed both in the Teachers' Council and the Purchase Committee (for purchasing books, Laboratory equipment, sports equipment, computer and accessories) or the Building Committee (for maintenance of building: classrooms, toilet, laboratory etc.), and finally realized by the Governing Body, after considering the necessities of the concerned users. The main sources for the concerned financial allocations are the UGC Grant and the State Government Grant. The college has also received financial assistance from RUSA 2.0 in the FY 2018-19, a part of which is being utilized for renovation and upgradation of the existing facility. The college authority also makes sufficient budgetary allocations, as per requirement, within its limited resource, for procurement of books, laboratory equipment, sports equipment, computers and peripherals, as well as for upgradation and maintenance of the existing facilities. Best Practice I Academic Session 2018-19 Title of the Practice: Organization of Theme based Departmental Exhibitions Objectives of the Practice: 1. Developing an analytical mind and research oriented outlook and aptitude in students 2. To impart specialized knowledge by making learning an adventure 3. To develop a students abilities in thinking by arousing interest and stimulating imagination 4. To develop a student's ability to relate to different ideas and reveal them clearly and effectively wherever necessary. 5. Inculcating the virtues of team spirit, participation, collaboration, dedication and independent learning among the students 6. To sensitize the society to the current burning issues in the society. The Context: The traditional lecture and chalk and talk method of teaching in India has often encouraged a method of rote learning where the learners use memorization techniques based on repetition. On the other hand,

the modern approach to teaching involves the method of blended learning. Blended learning goes a step beyond rote learning and encourages participatory or active learning among the students. An exhibition is a perfect opportunity for participatory learning where the learners as a team can make an organised

presentation based on a theme. The Practice: Each year the students' representatives of the college organize the twin events of Freshers' Welcome and Annual Social function under the name of "Kristi". On this occasion, the college sets up about 16 to 18 dedicated temporary stalls or kiosks in the college premises where the students of the different departments of the college participate and arrange for an exhibition based on a particular theme. In the

academic session 2017-2018, this theme based departmental exhibition was organized on 7th and 8th November 2017. Again in the academic session 2018-19, the theme based departmental exhibition was held from 16th January 2019 to 18th January 2019. The themes that are chosen very often complement the curriculum of a given subject. Obstacles faced/Problems encountered: Paucity of funds and resources for putting up the exhibition stalls of the departments. Evidence of Success: The exhibition is mostly spear-headed by the students of the different

departments, occasionally consulting their departmental teachers. The organization of such departmental exhibitions has served as a platform and opportunity for the students to present their talents and potentials, to learn the nuances of team work and collaborative learning, understanding real life issues and for bonding and uniting the whole college as a single family. The

enthusiasm of the students is also reflected in the choice of themes or topics on which departmental exhibitions have been organized and the subsequent organized presentations made by the students in two successive academic years. Resources Required: Sponsors and funding required for setting up the exhibit stalls in the college premises. Raniganj Girls' College Best Practice II 2018-19 Title of the Practice: Inculcating integrity among the incumbents of the institution through birthday celebration The Context: In our day to day affairs we often forget the role played by an individual incumbent in smooth functioning of the institution. The contribution of each individual incumbent, irrespective of his/her designation, builds that harmonious base on which the institution is founded. However, over time we imbibe the habit of taking our coworkers for granted. It is only during their absence that we miss their presence, efficiency and contribution. Quoting here the famous American industrialist, Henry Ford, "Coming together is a beginning. Keeping together is progress. Working together is success".
